We are in the midst of a growth phase with the construction on the Anna Lamar Switzer Center for Visual Arts on the Pensacola campus and the Health Sciences Complex on the Warrington campus. Also, this year, WSRE hung its new digital antenna atop a new 2,000-foot tower in Baldwin County, Ala. We are now in the test phase with this and expect to come fully on-line with local programming later this year.

This growth could not be accomplished without the support of the community. In turn, PJC has been a critical partner with the community in regional planning and growth for the area:

- We were the first academic institution to join Florida's Great Northwest, whose goal is to identify economic development opportunities for Northwest Florida.
- In response to local changes in communications, networking and manufacturing industries, PJC has just introduced the Center for Information and Engineering Technology. Students will be able to spend just two years in these career programs and be prepared for employment in high salary careers locally.
- Providing quality professional development and technical skills training for Northwest Florida businesses, government agencies and industry is an important component of PJC's mission. Our workforce training efforts have expanded into PJC Corporate

Services. We have hired a new director of economic development and hope to see continued growth in that area.

In addition to our fine programs, we are truly proud of our students. The newly established Robinson Honors program attracted 42 first-year students this past year, and we are seeing the enrollment double for 2001-2002. We also renewed our Student Ambassador program to increase student retention and enrollment.

We look forward to providing continued growth and opportunities for our students and our community.



## **Program and Department News**

With three campuses, two centers and distance learning capabilities, PJC offers more than 100 areas of concentration leading to associate's degrees and certificates.

The associate of arts degree, with 40 areas of concentration during 2000-2001, is designed for transfer to upper level institutions. PJC offered 40 associate of science and associate of applied science programs last year for students whose career interests require specialized study, and 26 certificate programs for students preparing for expeditious entry into the job market.

- The Music Department presented its first annual Musical Showcase, featuring more than 100 PJC students. The showcase featured the Guitar Ensemble, Brass Ouintet, PJC Entertainers, Concert Chorale, String Ensemble, Jazz Ensemble, Percussion Ensemble and Wind Ensemble. The percussion and string ensembles are new to PJC this year.
- Members of the Physical Sciences Department developed a chemistry laboratory web page to help ensure the safety of students. It includes the full chemistry lab safety presentations in PowerPoint format, the PJC chemistry laboratory safety rules, and safety equipment floor plans for the four chemistry labs.



Department began the associate of science degree in Photographic Technology. This program will cover black and white photography, color photography and digital application. PJC has an articulation agreement with Florida A&M University for transfer to FAMU's bachelor of science program.

• The Visual Arts

- Culinary Management, Hospitality Management, and the Dietetic Technician programs have merged into the Behavioral Sciences/ Human Services Department. By unifying the three programs, students benefit from shared classroom facilities, teaching resources and faculty.
- The English Department debuted a new, fully equipped computer classroom. The classroom is designed for students in writing courses and has 25 computers around the room, all connected to the teacher's computer. There is interactive software so teachers and students can read each other's writing and do peer editing and reviewing. Internet capability also allows students to use the computers for research projects. In addition, there is an overhead projector on which writing from any computer terminal can be projected on the screen. Finally, there are conference

tables in the center of the room for discussion and group work. The room is scheduled mornings and evenings with composition classes and is used in the afternoons as an open lab for students.

• PJC partnered with Cox Communications. a local cable-service provider, for the Success by Degrees program. Cox employees were given time from their job duties one morning each week for four semesters in order to complete the four courses comprising the program (Introduction to Business, Marketing, and Economics I and ID. As a result of this program, Cox Communications was recognized by the cable industry for excellence in providing education for its employees. Success by Degrees is being used as a model by other communications companies.

PJC is recognized, both locally and nationally, as a leader in technical training. PJC's new Center for Engineering and Information Technology was recently established to produce skilled labor for the increasing number of high-tech jobs in Northwest Florida.

For years, PJC has provided the labor pool for health care providers. In turn, the health care community has taken a lead role in securing funding for enhancements to our health care career programs, including the new, \$6 million Health Sciences Complex now under construction on the Warrington campus. The Health Sciences Complex will provide a mock hospital setting for education and training.

In addition to college credit programs, providing quality professional development and technical skills training for Northwest Florida businesses, government agencies and industry is an important component of PJC's mission. Our workforce training efforts have expanded into PJC Corporate Services. PJC Corporate Services offers customized classes and professional development training, and is the area's exclusive certified Achieve Global (Zenger Miller) partner.

### PJC is recognized as a leader in technical training.

In response to changes in communications, networking and manufacturing industries, PJC is pleased to introduce the Center for Information and Engineering Technology, encompassing computer science programs, information technology programs, and engineering technology programs.

A student spending just two years in one of these career programs will be prepared for employment that often includes a beginning salary of \$25,000 to \$35,000.

In addition to lucrative job opportunities, each program provides hands-on training, cutting-edge technology, state-of-the-art labs, and experienced faculty. The Center offers 12 associate degree programs that include several professional certification programs. Graduates of these programs can expect high employment rates.

Through a generous gift from Ray Russenberger, an endowment for the new Telecommunications Engineering Technology program was established. The endowment will provide speakers for the program, faculty and student training opportunities, and instructional software. A student spending just two years or less in one of PJC's health career programs will be prepared for employment that often includes flexible hours and a salary range from \$14,000 to \$50,000 per year.



### **HEALTH SCIENCES COMPLEX**

Construction is underway for PJC's Health Sciences Complex on the Warrington campus. The new facility will help maintain the hard-earned standards of excellence and relieve the overcrowded classrooms of the Warrington campus health-related programs.

PJC began construction with financial support from private donations and state funding. The building is scheduled to be completed by May 2002 and is estimated to cost \$6 million. The two-story, 53,000 square foot, medical training facility will house an ambulance bay, emergency room facilities, and a surgical suite.







### OUR THANKS TO THE LOCAL HEALTH CARE COMMUNITY

This state-of-the-art health complex could not have become a reality without generous gifts from the D.W. McMillan Trust, Bay Design Associates, and the Marks Foundation. Also contributing to the project were Baptist Health Care, Sacred Heart Health System, West Florida Regional Medical Center, Santa Rosa Medical Center, and West Florida Medical Center Clinic, P.A.

In total, these organizations have contributed just over \$1 million, which has generated an additional \$600,000 from state matching funds. Their contributions will provide for state-of-the-art medical training equipment and professional training for faculty.

### SWITZER VISUAL ARTS CENTER

Construction began on the new Anna Lamar Switzer Center for Visual Arts in December 2000. This expansion and renovation, the result of a \$1 million gift by the Switzer and Reilly families, will feature a new lecture hall, expanded photography areas, an expanded art gallery and completely renovated interior of the current building. The plans, created by Sam Marshall Architects, call for specialty landscaping, a new grand entrance and additional lighting. The project is scheduled to be completed in January 2002.






### ANNA LAMAR SWITZER GIFT TOUCHES STUDENTS, FACULTY AND COMMUNITY
