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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

For Pensacola Junior College, 2005-2006 was a challenging yet extraordinary academic year.

While the college was still making repairs due to almost \$10 million in damages from Hurricane Ivan, we suffered additional destruction from Hurricane Dennis in July 2005, followed by Hurricane Katrina the next month.

Unfortunately, major storms often destroy much more than buildings and trees. Hundreds of our students faced such upheaval from losing their homes and jobs, they were forced to put their educations on hold. Hurricanes Dennis and Katrina added to the college's existing 5 percent loss in enrollment due to Hurricane Ivan.

Through all of the inconvenience and frustration of storm repairs, enrollment loss and resulting budget cuts, our faculty and staff continued to provide the top-notch education that



is expected at PJC. In fact, they responded to adversity with determination and innovation, securing grants and launching several new programs beneficial to the college and the community.

In response to the influx of Hispanic workers after the hurricanes, the Downtown Center initiated a much-needed series of occupational Spanish classes that drew hundreds of participants.

To support the construction boom following the storms, PJC partnered with Habitat for Humanity to provide a carpentry program with training that can move workers from minimum-wage jobs to satisfying construction careers.

Our acclaimed nursing program was recognized with a \$1.3 million federal grant to increase its course offerings, graduate more registered nurses and combat a critical nursing shortage in the local healthcare industry. This expanded program has already

opened doors for partnerships with the University of West Florida and Florida State University.

Our Dual Enrollment program graduated a record number of students, many of whom received their associate's degree in our May commencement days before attending their own high school graduation.

In October 2005, the Foundation celebrated its 40th anniversary with new scholarships, endowed teaching chairs and improved facilities, a

pleasant reminder of the tremendous community support that PJC has long enjoyed.

In April 2006, we recognized the ongoing contributions of our devoted faculty as we dedicated the William D. and Mary Ellen Spears **Behavioral Sciences** Building. Besides giving PJC almost 30 years of lively lectures and innovative programs, retired professor Mary Ellen Spears and her late husband also made the college a beneficiary of their estate.

As you read about our students, staff and programs, you will see why I continue to be optimistic for the future. This is a strong, fiscally healthy college with a rich history spanning almost six decades, and we will continue to serve the families and businesses of this community well into the future.

During Honors Day ceremonies, 130 students were recognized for scholastic achievement, leadership and service.


With almost 60 student organizations and 65 sports activities available, PJC students have abundant opportunities for fellowship and personal growth.

 Major renovation was completed on Building 4300 at the Milton campus. This renovation included a new HVAC system, new lighting, and a new area for cosmetology classes with a new outdoor break area.

2005 followed by Hurricane Katrina the next month. The Milton campus

felt the greatest impact from Hurricane Dennis with major damage to the library and a greenhouse.

Although PJC was in the midst of Hurricane Ivan repairs when Hurricanes Dennis and Katrina hit, the college dealt with the additional

clean-up and destruction, managing to complete most of the combined hurricane repairs within the fiscal year. Repairs to

planetarium were particularly important due to their wide-spread use by the community.

Pool repairs went swimmingly well and the aquatics program reopened December 2005. The pool is also home to the championship Pirates Masters swim team.

Renovations to the 107-seat Planetarium and Space Theatre were completed in June 2006.





With a dome that is 40 feet in diameter, the planetarium supports PJC's academic programs and provides a unique venue for informal science education and entertainment to area residents and visitors.

Evidence of the college's recovery after three hurricanes came on the first anniversary of Hurricane Ivan, Sept. 16, 2005. The college hosted a threeday presentation of "Hurricane Monologues" in the Ashmore Fine Arts Auditorium, which had been damaged during Ivan. The communitywide event played to packed houses and raised funds for hurricane relief through Rebuild Northwest Florida.

PJC Goes Wireless

PJC partnered with Wave Net of Pensacola and Cisco Systems Inc. to install a state-of-the-art wireless system across the Pensacola, Warrington and Milton campuses as well as the Downtown Center in May 2006.

As the largest Cisco wireless system in Northwest Florida, the college is poised to provide the wireless mesh for a host of applications.

"We envision using this system in a variety of ways, from supporting the training of nursing students at the Warrington campus to using wireless PDAs that can do remote soil monitoring for the horticulture program at the Milton campus," says William Meloy, director of Computer Services and Telecommunications Systems at PJC.

"The wireless network also will be available for special events on PJC campuses."


ATHLETICS

A well-rounded athletics program is just as valuable at the community college level as at the university level. At PJC, it's not just about winning the trophy. It's also about developing the student as a whole.

- PJC Pirate volleyball team, coached by Pete Pena and Brent Beckstrom, defeated rival Gulf Coast Community College to clinch its fourth Panhandle Conference title in the last five years and advance to the state tournament in Lakeland in November 2005.

PJC Responds to Katrina Disaster

On the first anniversary of Hurricane Ivan, Sept. 16, 2005, President Tom Delaino led a team of staff and students to deliver supplies and a hot lunch to Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College that was damaged by Hurricane Katrina on Aug. 29, 2005.

With President Delaino and crew grilling hamburgers and hotdogs, more than 800 meals were served to GCCC students. staff and faculty, as well as their young children who were on the GCCC campus because the local K-12 schools had not yet reopened.

Within days after Katrina hit, PJC began numerous relief efforts:

NURSING PROGRAMS

Million Dollar Grant Helps Combat Nursing Shortage

The U. S. Department of Labor awarded PJC's nursing program \$1.3 million for its threeyear project, Alternate Strategies for Continuing Education and Nursing Development (ASCEND).

PJC was one of seven Florida community colleges to attract a Community Based Job Training grant from the Labor Department in fall 2005.

The major goal of PJC's ASCEND project is to lessen the local nursing shortage by supplying a greater number of highly qualified registered nurses to area hospitals.



Plans include weekend classes, more clinical training space at area hospitals, a new program to prepare paramedics to become registered nurses, sharing resources with the University of West Florida, and retention strategies.



Area hospitals have shown support by providing clinical space for training the nursing students.

They also have provided funding for clinical instruction, space for a student resource room and financial support for students.

ASCEND partners include Baptist Health Care, Sacred Heart

Health System, Santa Rosa Medical Center, West Florida Healthcare, Northwest Florida Health Council, Florida Association of Health Planning Agencies Inc., West Florida Area Health Education Center, University of West Florida, Escambia and Santa Rosa county school districts, economic development organizations and workforce boards.

PJC Partners with Universities

PJC's high-tech facilities on the Warrington campus paved the way for nursing program partnerships with the University of West Florida and with Florida State University.

UWF nursing students are taking several classes in our Atwell Health Sciences Complex. UWF faculty initially taught four courses to their students on the Warrington campus but offered five courses the following semester.

PJC's Mary Ekdahl Smart Center for Patient Simulation Training and Research is available to the UWF students and faculty on the Warrington campus. The center is equipped with nine high-fidelity patient simulators to give students hands-on experience in lifethreatening situations without risk to an actual patient.

Through computer simulation, students get to role play various scenarios — such as heart attacks and child birth — that they likely would not get to perform in a real hospital emergency room.

PJC partnered with Florida State University through the Florida SUCCEED grant to provide graduate nursing courses to nurses who currently hold a bachelor of science in nursing degree.

The grant provided about \$20,000 to establish an interactive classroom on the Warrington campus for use in the graduate courses.

Healthcare Programs Garner Community Support

Generous support for PJC's nursing programs and patient-simulation center has come from community members as well as grants.

Retired pharmaceutical executive Bill Smart donated almost \$167,000 to purchase and install a state-of-theart video recording system for the simulation center.

With state matching funds, the gift totals \$250,000 and provides specialized recording equipment

needed for teaching students clinical skills using the patient simulators, giving them instant feedback.

The Kugelman Foundation donated \$250,000 to the nursing program that totals \$400,000 with state matching funds. The Kugelman gift will be disbursed over the next five years to support interactive technology for PJC's new nursing center.









PJC Nursing Program Expands

When PJC introduced a two-year nursing program in 1958, it was the first of its kind in the Southeast. Almost half a century later, PJC's Nursing department continues to be a pace-setter, offering new programs to accommodate local healthcare needs.





