Message*

HELLO FRIENDS, SUPPORTERS, AND COLLEAGUES,

The 2022-2023 academic year was a banner year for Pensacola State College. Construction began in June on the Bear, Jones, Moore, and Reeves Center for Math and Advanced Technology. The facility — Phase II of the Mary Ellison Baars building replacement — will be completed in Fall 2023.

The ribbon-cutting ceremony for the PSC Truck Driving Training Facility in the Santa Rosa Industrial Park East occurred in September. With the new 13,000-square-foot commercial driver's license (CDL) training and testing facility and driving range in our CDL program, the College will be able to increase student capacity.

The College also received numerous accolades:

- U.S. News and World Report listed our online Bachelor of Science in Nursing Program among the best in Florida and the U.S. for the fourth consecutive year. In the publication's "Best Online Bachelor's Programs 2022 Edition," the program was ranked second among Florida College System institutions, fifth among all Florida colleges and universities, and 47th in the nation.

- For the 13th consecutive year, the College was selected as a 2022 Military Friendly® School by Victory Media. PSC was one of 282 schools to earn the "Gold" status.

- Pensacola State was named in the top 25 as a best public college or university in the southeast by Military Times in the publication's 2022 "Best for Vets: Colleges" edition. The College was ranked nationally in the top 100 among public schools in the U.S.

Last year, the PSC Foundation completed a historic three-year capital campaign – raising \$12.6 million. Our initial goal was \$11 million, but we surpassed that with commitments from 1,329 generous donors.

In September, "The Game Plan" campaign was announced – the first PSC Athletics capital campaign in recent history. The capital campaign will target general support, facilities, the new construction of a soccer

complex, and scholarship endowments.

Plans are to create a top-tier soccer complex on the Pensacola campus with bleachers, a concession stand, locker room, press box, scoreboard, and more. The College fielded a women's soccer team in Fall 2023.

Other major funding initiatives include constructing an Academic Success Center for student-athletes and an Athletic Training Center.

In 1948, the College opened in Aiken Boarding House on Palafox Street with 136 students. Since then, Pensacola State has awarded more than 120,000 degrees and certificates to graduates.

As we celebrate our 75th year, the College remains committed to transforming the futures of our students and their families. Along with small classes and highly-qualified faculty, PSC offers postsecondary education at an affordable price.

Last year, students received over \$30 million in scholarships, financial aid, and grants, resulting in a 95 percent graduating class that was loan-free.

PSC continues to offer flexible schedules with day, night, face-to-face, online, and hybrid classes. We meet students where they are, whether on our Pensacola, Milton, or Warrington campuses or at Century, South Santa Rosa, or the Santa Rosa Industrial Park East centers.

In closing, thank you to all of the donors, friends and supporters of Pensacola State College. Your unwavering support is so very much appreciated.

Five current and former area residents — Gregg Beck, Gerry Goldstein, Mary Hoxeng, Dr. Paul Szuch and Marie Young — were recognized as 2022 Pensacola State College Distinguished Alumni during an awards gala on June 11.

Honored for outstanding service to the College and community were:

Lifetime Achievement – Paul Szuch: This award is presented to an alumnus who has reached state, regional or national recognition and represents the highest level of achievement in their profession or service. Szuch is the retired president of the Lamar Institute of Technology.

Hometown Hero – Marie Young: This award is presented to an alumnus who has achieved

success within the College's service area and has demonstrated notable community involvement. Young is a beloved educator and former Escambia County Commissioner whose community involvement is legendary.

Against the Odds – Gregg Beck: This award is presented to an alumnus who has succeeded despite financial, sociological or physical adversity. Beck overcame a tough childhood to become an entrepreneur and business success.

Spirit of Pensacola State College – Gerry Goldstein: This award is presented to an alumnus who exemplifies the highest standards and has made a lasting, significant impact on the lives of others through service to the College and community. Goldstein is a successful businessman and educator who became a leader in the investment banking world.

Road Less Traveled – Mary Hoxeng: Presented to an individual in the community who follows their heart in a challenging and uncertain direction, and the rewards are beyond expectations. A Northwest Florida media magnate, Hoxeng is known for her community involvement.

PSC President Ed Meadows also honored alumna and PSC associate professor and coach Carla Williams, who died due to domestic violence.

The five Distinguished Alumni Association Award recipients have helped Pensacola State College in numerous ways, from endowing scholarships to volunteering to organize and host events that raise money for scholarships that benefit students.

PENSACOLA STATE HONORS SUPPORTER MARY HOXENG

Pensacola State supporter and advocate Mary Hoxeng was bestowed an honorary Bachelor of Arts in Humane Letters degree from the College in October.

The College's District Board Trustees Chairman, Dr. Troy Tippet, and President Ed Meadows presented Hoxeng with the honorary degree and a proclamation during the board meeting on Oct. 18 on the Warrington campus.

A 2022 Pensacola State College Alumni Association Distinguished Alumni Award recipient, Hoxeng is a Pensacola State College Alumni Association Lifetime Charter Member.

She is also a Northwest Florida media magnate known for her community

involvement. Hoxeng and her husband, Dave, own four local radio stations — CatCountry 98.7, News Radio 1620/92.3, WEBY-ESPN 1330/99.1 and Playlist 94.5. Mary Hoxeng is general manager and chief operating officer of the four stations.

The Hoxengs have been supporters of the College since they moved to the area in 2002. The couple also established the Dave and Mary Hoxeng Endowed Scholarship for journalism students.

Active in the community, Mary Hoxeng serves on the Escambia County Tourist Development Advisory Council, the Escambia County Sheriff's Foundation Board, the Florida Five Flags Fiesta Commission, the Five Flags Rotary Club Board, the Council on Aging of

West Florida, ARC Gateway and is the Leadership Pensacola Alumni Board Chair.

She was previously membership chair for Impact 100 Pensacola Bay Area, is a Rotary Foundation Paul Harris Fellow, and was one of the Pensacola News Journal's 2010 "Women of the Year" award recipients.

In 2009, the Hoxengs were honored by the Greater Pensacola Chamber with the 2009 "Business Leaders of the Year" PACE award. In 2021, the Hoxengs received the 2021 "Spirit of Pensacola" PACE Award.

2022-2023 Gold Military Friendly® School

Pensacola State College was selected as a 2022-2023 Gold Military Friendly® School by Victory Media. This is the 13th year the College has received the accolade and the first time earning the gold designation.

2022 Best for Vets

PSC was ranked the 23rd best public college or university in the Southeast by Military Times in the publication's 2022 "Best for Vets: Colleges" edition. Nationally, PSC ranked 78th among public schools.

TRIUMPH GULF COAST AWARDS PSC \$11.9 MILLION GRANT

Pensacola State College was awarded a nearly \$12 million grant to fund construction of Phase II of the replacement of the Mary Ellison Baars building, which was demolished in 2019.

The \$11,998,919 grant comes from Triumph Gulf Coast, the organization charged by the state of Florida with distributing the \$1.5 billion settlement from BP following the 2010 oil spill.

Money from the grant will help fund the 46,133-square-foot Bear, Jones, Moore and Reeves center for Math and Advanced

Technology construction, which will be home to Cybersecurity/IT programs and other high-tech fields. Funds also will be used to purchase equipment, supplies, certificate and student fee waivers, recruiting, technology and salaries for Cybersecurity/IT programs.

The building's name pays tribute to four prominent Pensacola families who have collectively given \$1 million to fund STEM-related scholarships at the College.

The Bear, Jones, Moore and Reeves center for Math and Advanced Technology is estimated to cost between \$22 million and \$25 million. Funding is also provided by the state, which previously gave the College \$15.4 million for the construction project and is expected to commit another \$3.5 million later this year.

The grant requires PSC Cybersecurity/IT programs to issue at least 6,448 industry-recognized CAPE certificates over a 10-year period. The grant will be paid over a three-year period.

WOMEN'S SOCCER PROGRAM RECEIVES \$2,000 NJCAA FOUNDATION GRANT

Pensacola State College's new women's soccer program received a boost from the NJCAA Foundation in 2022.

The program — which is scheduled to field its first team in fall 2023 — was awarded a \$2,000 NJCAA Sport Opportunity Grant. Awarded based on need and allotted funding, the grant is available for NJCAA member colleges to apply as they expand sport offerings at their institution

while increasing student-athlete access and achievement. PSC Athletic Director, Bryan Lewallyn, said the grant will assist with initial startup costs for the program — uniforms, balls, nets, or other equipment.

Brian Luckett, NJCAA Foundation Executive Director, said the organization is excited to further support the growth of NJCAA member colleges and the sport

programs they offer through the newly-created grant.

The soccer team will be the second women's athletic program the College has added in recent years and will compete at the Division II level. In 2019, a women's cross-country team joined the roster of PSC athletic programs.

In September, Pensacola State President Ed Meadows and PSC Athletics Hall of Fame inductee, Doug Bates, announced

Targeting general support, facilities, new construction and endowments, the capital campaign plans include the construction of a top-tier

soccer complex on the Pensacola campus – complete with bleachers, a concession stand, locker room, press box, scoreboard, and more.

The College will field a women’s soccer team in Fall 2023.

Other major funding initiatives include constructing an Academic Success Center and an Athletic Training Center for student-athletes, emphasizing nutrition, locker rooms for volleyball, cross-country, and softball batting cages.

“We’re going to make you even more proud of PSC than you are now,” Bates said.

“Our mission now is to go out into the community and let everyone know that this is where they need to invest.”

Also, the “Game Plan” will offer naming opportunities – ranging from \$10,000 to \$2 million — for new structures and some existing athletic facilities. Donors also can give to specific teams or certain facilities/structures.

“We’re going to make this a special place,” Bates said. “This will be a facility to match a championship program.”

Mark Yepishin was named the team's first coach. Assistant coaches are former Pensacola High School head coach, Paul Fernandez, and Valentina Duque, a former member of the Columbian National Team.

Four other Florida College Systems institutions — Eastern Florida, Daytona, Polk and Pasco-Hernando state colleges — have women's soccer teams. Lewallyn said the Pirates will compete against those FCS schools and colleges in Mississippi, Georgia, Louisiana and Tennessee.

In 2022, Pensacola State received a \$2,000 NJCAA Sport Opportunity Grant — available for NJCAA member colleges to apply as they expand sports offerings while increasing student-athlete access and achievement. The grant funds were used to purchase soccer balls for the program.

In early 2022, Pensacola State College announced the formation of a women's soccer team. The new PSC athletics team, with 18 to 22 student-athletes, is expected to start play during the fall semester.

For the inaugural season, PSC home games will be played at Ashton Brosnham Sports Complex with a practice field on the Pensacola campus next to the tennis courts. A permanent soccer complex and field will eventually be built to host home games.



CARLA WILLIAMS INDUCTED INTO PSC ATHLETICS HALL OF FAME

Pensacola State College Athletic director, Bryan Lewallyn, said Carla Williams might be “the best ever Pirate to come through our halls.”

An outstanding basketball player, coach, scholar, educator, and mentor, Williams was the only Pirate inducted in the 2022 Pensacola State College Athletic Hall of Fame during a ceremony held Sept. 27 in the Hartsell Arena.

Williams died in May 2022 as a result of domestic violence. Following her death, the Carla Williams Memorial Endowed Scholarship was established to help lift, inspire, and support PSC student-athletes now and long into the future.

An associate professor at the College, Williams spent more than 24 years working in PSC’s athletic programs, Collegiate High, and the Mathematics and Computer Science Department.

An academic and athletic standout at Graceville High School, Williams led the school to a state championship in 1992. After high school, Williams played two years at PSC, where she was selected to All-Academic, All-Conference and All-Region teams both years. After PSC, Williams played and excelled at Florida State University.

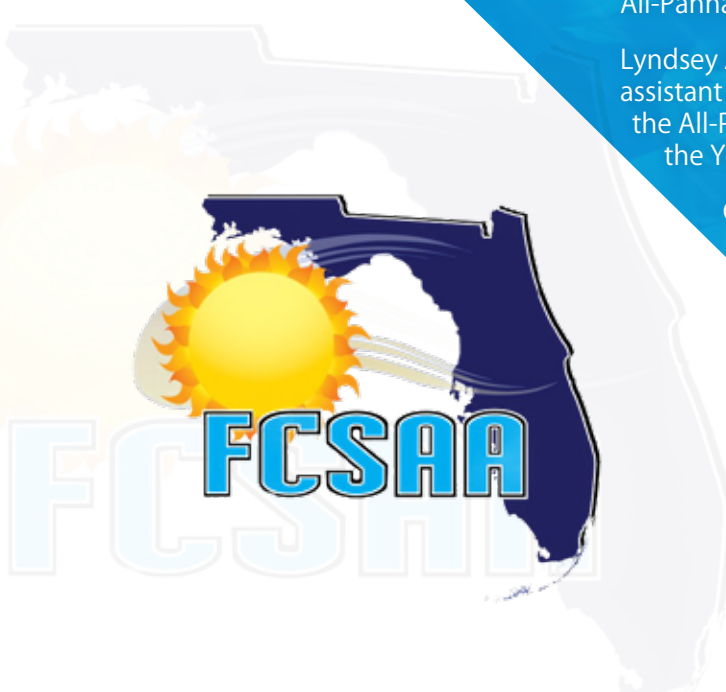

PSC OUTDOOR GALLERY ADDS VIBRANCY

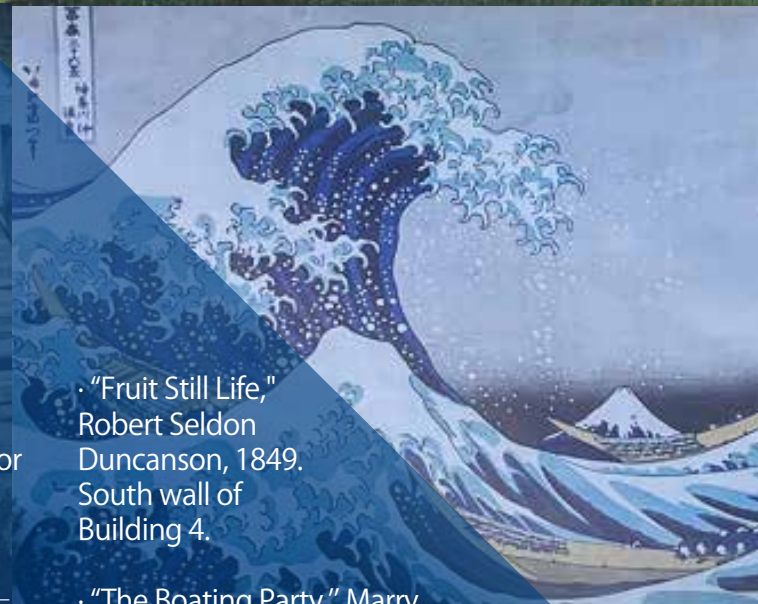
The Pensacola State Visual Arts Department added seven new art installations to the College's Outdoor Gallery last year.

Three large reproductions of works from the "Birds of America" series — "Brown Pelican," 1832, "Red-headed Woodpecker," 1828, and "American Flamingo," 1838 — by legendary artist and naturalist John James Audubon are among the masterpieces.

The 22 feet 6 inches tall and 15 feet wide pieces are installed on the southeast wall of Chadbourne Library.

The other reproductions are:

• "Horse and Boats," 1883 and "A Sunday on La Grande Jatte," 1884, George Seurat. Both are on the east wall of the Lou Ross Center, facing the track area.

GROUND BROKEN ON PENSACOLA STATE STEM FACILITY

Ground was broken June 8 on Phase II of Pensacola State College’s STEM facility — the Bear, Jones, Moore, and Reeves Center for Math and Advanced Technology.

Site work on the 46,133-square-foot facility — estimated to cost between \$22 million to \$25 million — began in January. The building is tentatively scheduled for completion by late 2023.

The building’s name pays tribute to four Pensacola families – the Bear Family Foundation, Jo and Bill Jones, the late Pete Moore Family and Jim Reeves — who have collectively given \$1 million to fund STEM-related scholarships at the College.

Phase I — the Baars Technology Building — officially opened in April 2021. The \$15 million 23,839-square-foot building is home to STEM programs such as cybersecurity, computer science, and math.

The facility will also include a third-floor connector linking Phase I and II buildings. A rooftop terrace also is included in the construction plan.

Along with state funding, a nearly \$12 million grant will be used to fund the construction of Phase II. The \$11,998,919 grant comes from Triumph Gulf Coast, the organization charged by the state of Florida with distributing the \$1.5 billion settlement from BP stemming from the 2010 oil spill.

The State of Florida previously gave the College \$15.4 million for the project and was expected to commit another \$3.5 million.

The grant will also be used to purchase equipment, supplies, certificate and student fee waivers, recruiting, technology, and salaries for Cybersecurity/IT programs.

Dr. Meadows praised the state and local legislative delegation and Triumph Gulf Coast for appropriating funds for the facility.

Florida Architects designed the Phase I and Phase II buildings. Ajax Corp was the Phase I general contractor. The Morette Company is the Phase II general contractor.

TRUCK DRIVER TRAINING FACILITY RIBBON CUTTING

Pensacola State College officially cut the ribbon on its newest site, the Truck Driver Training Facility, on Sept. 20. Located at 5957 Jeff Ates Road in the Santa Rosa Industrial Park East in Milton, the \$7.8 million Truck Driver Training Facility is home

to the College’s Commercial Vehicle Driver Vocational Certificate Program. Since Spring 2021, 69 students have completed the truck driving training program and earned commercial driver’s licenses. The College started the program in 2019. Pictured are

WSRE PBS serves the Mobile-Pensacola media market with multiplatform delivery of award-winning local productions, trusted PBS programming and the No. 1 educational media brand for children, PBS KIDS. WSRE also broadcasts Create and World channels, and a fifth over-the-air channel – WSRE Connect – is now in development to offer local programs in the future.

LEARNING MEDIA FOR FAMILIES AND SCHOOLS

With anytime-anywhere digital access, the station's on-demand viewership has grown exponentially. The station's largest streaming audience is made of up families watching WSRE PBS KIDS and using the PBS KIDS app for learning activities and games on the go.

WSRE PBS KIDS averaged 36,660 local users per month and 804,000 monthly streams across digital platforms in 2022.

WSRE's online educational resources are also gaining ground in local classrooms. Florida PBS LearningMedia provides local teachers and students with standards-aligned lesson plans and thousands of historical video clips, images and primary source documents to enhance instruction.

To help teachers prepare for the new school year, the station hosted 300 social studies, history, and civics teachers for the Florida Department of Education's Summer Civics Development Workshop in June, and provided online professional development activities focused on updated PBS LearningMedia collections over the summer months.

Each spring, WSRE brings the community together for a free, family-fun event focused on early learning, health and safety, and the neighborly values of Mister Rogers and Daniel Tiger.

Following two years of cancellation due to the pandemic, Be My Neighbor Day returned to the Jean and Paul Amos Performance Studio on April 23 with more than 30 community organizations taking part.

Food donations were collected for Manna Food Pantries, and children were encouraged to come in costume as their favorite PBS KIDS characters. Indoors, a "Daniel Tiger's Neighborhood" matinee marathon was shown on the big screen – movie theater style – in addition to a costume parade, story time and performances by Pensacola Children's Chorus and Mixon Magic Performing Arts.

Outdoors, exhibitors offered children's activities and information for families. Exhibits included the Escambia County Sheriff's Office Mounted Posse, the Pensacola Police Department K-9 Unit and new Blue Angels themed vehicle, a Pensacola Fire Department fire engine, and Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission's educational display.



LOCAL PRODUCTION HIGHLIGHTS

The new local program “Connecting the Community” debuted in February, spotlighting a variety of cultural interests. Director, Community and Special Initiatives, Dr. Rameca Vincent Leary, is the show’s producer and host, covering cause-related and community-based programs with a variety of perspectives from her guests.

The premiere episode focused on veterans and commemorated the legacy of Gen. Daniel “Chappie” James Jr.

In its third season, the station’s increasingly popular horror film series “Nightmare Theatre” was picked up by Alabama PBS. The series is also airing on WFSU in Tallahassee; East Tennessee PBS (WETP) in Knoxville, Tenn.; WGCU

in Fort Myers; WJCT in Jacksonville; Nashville Public Television (WNPT) in Nashville, Tenn.; and WTCL in Chattanooga, Tenn.

Production of “Conversations with Jeff Weeks” returned in the fall with a new show logo, set design, graphics and animation. The brand refresh of this long-running series debuted with interviews featuring author Clint Crockett, election supervisors David Stafford and Tappie Villane, mayor-elect D.C. Reeves, musician Peter Keys, PBS Food host Alejandra Ramos, attorney Troy Rafferty and actor Dale Dye.

The station also created new branding for its music series “StudioAmped” and hosted five fall concerts: Royal Horses, Lex and the Luthors, Jessie Ritter, Stormfolk and

the Pensacola Beach Songwriters Festival show featuring Donna Britton Bukevicz, Dani Carroll and Peter Keys. The performances were recorded for future broadcast.

In its 13th season, “StudioAmped” showcases the original music of regional bands and artists. In conjunction with the series, WSRE and the Pensacola Beach Songwriters Festival teamed up to host a songwriting workshop for Pace Center for Girls.

Students from the Pace Center program joined Nashville songwriters Anne Buckle, Tim Buppert, Caitlin Evanson and Jerry Vandiver on campus to learn about the art of songwriting and write a song together.
