Course Description: Covers the following topics: functions and functional notation; domains and ranges of functions; graphs of functions and relations; operations on functions; inverse functions; linear, quadratic, and rational functions; absolute value and radical functions; exponential and logarithmic properties, functions, and equations; systems of equations and inequalities, applications (such as curve fitting, modeling, optimization, exponential growth and logarithmic growth and decay.). Meets A.A. general education Category III.

Credit hours: 3

Prerequisites and Co-requisites: Appropriate scores on Florida Entry Level Placement Exam or completion of MAT1033 with a grade of "C" or better.

Learning Outcomes: Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to solve problems relating to:

- 1. Solve linear, quadratic, rational, absolute value, and radical equations and inequalities, algebraically and graphically.
- 2. Use exponential and logarithmic properties to analyze functions and solve equations.
- 3. Analyze functions and relations.
- 4. Sketch and interpret graphs of linear, quadratic, rational, absolute value, radical, exponential and logarithmic functions.
- 5. Solve systems of equations and inequalities.
- 6. Set up and solve applications problems related to the above concepts.

Other necessary materials:

A Scientific calculator is required.

Evaluation/Assessment Measures:

Prior to each chapter test, we will have a homework check. You will work it at home and <u>turn it</u> <u>in on the day of the chapter test</u>. These problems typically come from the chapter tests at the end of each chapter in the textbook. They also serve as an excellent basis of review for each inclass test. All work should be done thoroughly, neatly, and in pencil in order to receive full credit. Sloppy or incomplete work will be penalized.

There will be a cumulative homework grade (4 x 25 points each = 100 points), 4 regular tests (100 points each), and one $\underline{\text{comprehensive}}$ final exam (100 points). Your lowest $\underline{\text{regular}}$ test score will be dropped.

<u>The final exam is mandatory for all students</u> and will <u>not</u> count as a drop grade. The total number of points to be earned in the course is 500. Therefore, to calculate your final grade I will sum your points and divide by 5.

NO make-up exams will be given. There is NO make-up homework. There is NO extra credit. Late assignments will NOT be accepted. A missed regular exam will count as your drop grade. However, if you know you will miss an exam for a legitimate reason it may be possible to take the exam early. You must be proactive and communicate with me before the exam occurs in order to pursue this option.

Anyone caught cheating will receive an F for the course.
