Course Description: A survey of psychology as a social science. Covers the biological and social determinants of human cognition, emotion, and behavior. Attention will also be given to the history of the discipline, forms of psychopathology, and the growing role of brain science within the field.

Writing Emphasis Requirement: A minimum of three fully developed, multi-paragraph, evaluated writing assignments, not including a final examination, are required.

Writing Emphasis Requirement: Instructors return each evaluated writing assignment to a student before submission of the next evaluated writing assignment.

Writing Emphasis Requirement: Only individual student work may count toward the minimum three evaluated writing assignments.

Writing Emphasis Requirement: Grading rubrics will be used for each evaluated writing assignment. These rubrics will be shared with each student.

Writing Emphasis Requirement: The grades earned on the writing assignments must reflect student performance in college-level writing and significantly impact the final course grade.

Exams

Only two exams will be administered throughout the semester, a midterm and a final exam. Both will be timed exams comprised of multiple-choice, multiple answer, matching, and/or true/false items. All assessments, including the exams, will be administered through the Canvas course site. Each exam will be available for completion for a set period of time. **Exams must be submitted by deadline (as specified in the class schedule below); forgetfulness is NOT an acceptable excuse for failing to complete an exam.** Regardless, if you did not take an exam, for whatever reason, <u>please contact me as soon as possible</u>. *No make-up exams will be given without instructor permission.* <u>Your average exam score will account for 40% of your overall grade for the course.</u>

Chapter Quizzes

For each chapter, you will be assigned at least one quiz on the Canvas course site. All quizzes will be open book unless specified otherwise. The designated "chapter quiz" will be timed, so while you may use your book, it is strongly advised that you read the chapter BEFORE taking this quiz. Once you begin a chapter quiz, you MUST complete it. Other quizzes will require you to read supplemental material, such as news articles or websites; the links for each will be provided for you in the corresponding assignment's instructions. Chapter quizzes will be accessible for AT LEAST one week.

Each quiz must be *submitted* by <u>11:55 pm</u> of the due date (located in the class schedule below). *You may submit a quiz within 48 hours AFTER the due date, but you will be docked 50% of the total score.* <u>Your</u> *average score for the chapter quizzes will account for 15% of your overall grade.*

Discussion Board Posts

Throughout the course, you will be provided with discussion prompts that further address a topic discussed within each chapter. For each discussion board, you will be required to post a response to the prompt as well as comment on THREE of your fellow classmate's responses. Your posts will be graded for both completion and the quality of the content. Discussion boards will be accessible for AT LEAST one week.

Both posts must be made by <u>11:55 pm</u> of the due date (located in the class schedule); any posts made after this time will be considered late. The main response post is due the corresponding <u>Thursday</u> & the classmate responses on <u>Sunday</u>. Main response posts *submitted* after 11:55 pm are LATE, *however, you may submit them before the Sunday deadline for UP TO 50% credit for the assignment (additional points may be lost based on the grading rubric).* <u>Your average score for discussion posts will constitute 20% of your final grade</u>.

Chapter Reviews

As you absorb the material for each chapter, you should simultaneously answer the corresponding chapter review. Chapter reviews are open book and may be completed at your leisure. You will not be limited to a designated time period nor by the number of times you may access the assignment. Chapter reviews will be accessible for AT LEAST one week.

Reviews must be submitted by **11:55 pm** of the due date (located in the class schedule); any posts made after this time will be considered late. *You may submit a review within 48 hours AFTER the due date, but you will be docked 50% of the total score.* <u>Your average score for discussion posts will constitute 25% of your final grade</u>.

- 1. Define the science and practice of psychology as well as ethical considerations for research.
- 2. Identify major theories and theorists in psychology.
- 3. Compare different theoretical and methodical approaches to behavior, cognition, personality, intelligence, and development.
- 4. Recognize terms, names, concepts, and scientific experiments vital to understanding the science of psychology.
- 5. Apply psychological principles and findings to real world experiences.
- 6. Critically evaluate sources of information.
- 7. Outline the divisions and functions of the nervous system, neurons, and endocrine system and discuss how these affect behavior.
- 8. Recognize how the mind develops, how consciousness and unconsciousness impacts behavior, how people learn, how information is stored and organized, and how the brain processes memories.
- 9. Analyze components of social psychology including attitudes, conformity, and relationships.
- 10. Examine the impact of stress on health, how personality traits influence the effects of stress, and how to effectively cope with stress.
- 11. Discuss various psychological disorders and their treatment.
