Methods of Evaluation:

Tests: Four equal 100-point tests. No make up tests will be given; students will take tests they have missed along with the last test. Each test will comprise 25% of the final grade.

Listening Requirement: Listening is an essential part of this course. Therefore, each student is expected to devote adequate time listening to those recorded musical compositions which have been assigned. All of the tests except the first will contain a listening section.

Class Attendance: Absences will not be counted against the student. However, missing class will adversely affect the student's ability to complete assignments. It is the responsibility of the student to withdraw from the course if necessary.

Classroom Etiquette: Please turn off or silence cell phones. If you need to make or answer an emergency call, or read or send text messages, please excuse yourself from the classroom. Please use the back door if entering or leaving the classroom once we have begun.

Concert Attendance: All students will be required to attend a minimum of THREE live, musical performances chosen from an approved list. Failure to meet this requirement means a lowering of a student's grade by one letter for each concert/performance below the required three.

Students may earn Extra Credit by attending two performances (also from the approved list) beyond the requirement. Students will receive 5 points for the first extra performance and 5 points for the second performance. All extra credit points will be added to the student's final average.

Also note, there are concerts where limited free tickets are available. Tickets will be available three weeks before the event at the Lyceum ticket office in Building 8. You must sign in at the beginning of the concert and sign out at the end of the concert with the Lyceum assistant who will be stationed at the entrance of the performance hall.
