Textbook: This course does *not* require a textbook. On Canvas you can find curated reading for the course, all online and free and organized by topics in the order we will go through them, that will get you through the course. However, if you prefer one the book listed on page 1 of this syllabus will assist you in following along. It is a free online textbook, and the link to the text is available via the course Canvas page.

Exams: The exams will be primarily essay-based. They will be conducted at the regular class time, and will be proctored using Canvas. We will not be using any sort of lockdown browser. A review for each exam will be made available.

Written assignments: You will be submitting 3 written assignments throughout the semester (the due dates for each are clearly noted in the semester schedule), each covering major themes and issues covered in the textbook and the classroom. In each of these assignments, you will argue/take a side on an issue. All writing assignments will be submitted electronically, via Canvas. You will be issued topics/prompts at least one week before each writing assignment is due. Length will range from 2 - 4 pages, double spaced, 12 point font.

Turnitin: Your writing assignments will be submitted via Turnitin. Some of you might be familiar with this program. Turnitin is used as a plagiarism checker. Although it is often used to catch plagiarism after the fact, I prefer to use Turnitin as a teaching tool. If you submit drafts of your papers BEFORE they are due, you will have the opportunity to revise areas of your paper where you might be unintentionally plagiarizing sources and/or not citing them correctly. We will discuss this further in class before the due date of your first written assignment.

Participation: Your participation in this exercise counts for 15% of your total grade. Throughout the semester, there will be 3 participation assignments. We will be discussing this further in class. **You will not be required to speak in class.**
