Course Description	This course introduces students to rhetorical concepts and audience-centered approaches to writing including composing processes, language conventions and style, and critical analysis and engagement with written texts and other forms of communication.

<p>Course Learning Outcomes</p>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Students will apply rhetorical knowledge to communicate for a range of audiences and purposes. 2. Students will employ critical thinking to analyze forms of communication. 3. Students will engage in writing processes that involve drafting, revising, and reflecting.

Critical Thinking: The student analyzes, evaluates, and, if necessary, challenges the validity of ideas, principles, or data in order to develop informed opinions, probable predictions, or defensible conclusions. 2. Communication: The student effectively communicates knowledge and ideas. 3. Information Literacy: The student effectively locates, evaluates, and applies information from a variety of sources.
<p>General Education Writing Emphasis Course Requirements</p>	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. All writing used to fulfill the writing emphasis requirement must possess the five characteristics of college-level writing: 1) have a clearly identified central idea or thesis; 2) provide adequate support for the idea; 3) be organized clearly and logically; 4) show awareness of the conventions of standard written English; and 5) be formatted in an appropriate fashion for the assignment. 2. A minimum of four (4) evaluated assignments, which may include the final exam, is required. Because an extensive amount of writing is intended by Rule 6A-10.030, F.A.C., additional writing assignments may be used to satisfy this requirement. 3. The grades earned on the writing assignments must reflect student performance in college-level writing and significantly impact the final course grade. 4. All sections of a course must meet all requirements. 5. Instructors provide detailed feedback regarding the content, organization, and use of standard written English for all writing used to satisfy the requirement. 6. Instructors return each evaluated writing assignment to a student before the submission of the next evaluated writing assignment, with the exception of a final exam used to satisfy the requirement. 7. Only individual, original student work counts toward the extensive writing requirement; AI or machine-written content is not accepted. 8. The grading rubrics used for each writing assignment will be shared with students and will be uniformly applied as the assessment instrument in all sections of a course.

Essay 1 — Students will write a personal narrative describing an important moment in their lives, applying narrative and essay techniques.	10%
Essay 2 — Students will research and write about an influential person in their intended career field. This assignment emphasizes integrating sources to strengthen writing.	10%
Essay 3 (Timed In-class) — Students will respond to department-approved prompts based on Justin Huang’s “How I Overcame My Stuttering,” analyzing rhetorical strategies and structure.	10%
Documented Essay — Students will research and craft a persuasive argument on a topic of interest. Emphasis will be placed on sourcing reliable articles and incorporating evidence. All sources will be vetted according to department guidelines.	15%
Public Speaking Component — Students will present their research topic using an approved format (oral presentation, model presentation, or other department-approved method) to demonstrate effective communication skills.	5%
Final essay exam — Students will reflect on their research and writing process from the previous assignment. The accompanying quiz will be comprehensive, covering material from <i>An Introduction to Academic Writing and Thinking</i> .	20%
