<b>Course Description</b>	In this course, students will learn about the creative ideas and accomplishments of various cultures in various fields of humanities that may include art, architecture, drama, history, music, literature, philosophy, and religion. The course will include cultural expressions from the western canon and may also include expressions from around the globe.

<p>Assignments:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Class Policies Review Assignment – A review of classroom policies and expectations</li> <li>• Proctorio Set-Up Assignment – An exercise for the use of Proctorio</li> <li>• Prehistory and Mesopotamia Terms – A vocabulary list of important terms of Prehistoric and Ancient Mesopotamian eras</li> <li>• 2 Floods Comparison and Contrast – A critical thinking exercise comparing the flood from the <i>Epic of Gilgamesh</i> (Utnapishtim’s Flood) to the Flood in Genesis (Noah’s Flood)</li> <li>• Egypt and Bronze Age Greece Terms – A review of terms from the development of Egypt and period of Bronze Age Greece</li> <li>• The Role of the Gods – An overview of major gods, both Greek and Roman, and their function in ancient society</li> <li>• Trojan War Literature and Study Terms Rise of Greece – A vocabulary list of significant terms used in the Trojan War stories and in the initial Rise of the Greeks</li> <li>• Kings, Government, Society and Military – A matching exercise designed to acclimate students with the different roles commonly seen in Roman government, society and the military</li> <li>• Ancient Disaster: An Eyewitness Account – A critical thinking short essay evaluating the eruption of Mt. Vesuvius, the destruction of Pompeii and how it relates to Pliny the Younger’s letter 6:20</li> <li>• Church Architecture – An examination of the important areas of standard church architecture</li> <li>• Middle Ages Terms – A review of terms commonly used in the Middle Ages</li> <li>• Dante’s Hell Assignment – A quick look and identification of the 9 Circles of Hell according to Dante</li> </ul>	

- Writers, Thinkers and Music Terms – An examination of some significant contributors in the field of literature, philosophy, science and music, as well as musical terms used in the development of music from the Medieval to Classical Era
- European Explorers – A matching exercise reviewing significant explorers and their contribution to the development of the modern world.

Quizzes:

- Quiz I: Egypt, Mesopotamia, Bronze-Age Greece – An assessment of understanding of human development through the Greek Bronze Age
- Quiz II: Rise of Greece, Classical Greece and the Hellenistic Period – An assessment of understanding of the Greek developmental periods through the Roman conquest
- Quiz III: Rome - An assessment of understanding of the three periods of Roman history – Monarchy, Republic and Imperial Rome
- Quiz IV: The Middle Ages - An assessment of understanding of Middle Ages and the important developments and events of the time
- Quiz V: European Explorers and Scholars - An assessment of understanding of the period of European exploration and expansion as well as the significant scholars of this period

Exams:

- Exam I – Unit 1 – Prehistory through Greece – An assessment of knowledge from the beginnings of humanity to the fall of Greece
- Exam 2 – Unit 2 – Rome and the Middle Ages – An assessment of knowledge from the Rise of the Roman Empire through the Middle Ages
- Exam 3, Final Exam – Unit 3 – Humanism, Exploration and the Enlightenment – An assessment of knowledge primarily of the Renaissance, Humanism, Exploration and the Enlightenment with 15% of the exam comprehensive from the beginning of the course.

<b>Proctorio Test Monitoring</b>	<p>Selected tests for this course require the use of Proctorio, a test proctoring software that records audio, video (facial expressions and body movements), and the surrounding environment during the entire length of the test. Proctorio runs as an extension in the Google Chrome browser and only works in Canvas. You will need a webcam and microphone to use Proctorio. You must take your tests on a laptop, desktop, or Chromebook computer as Proctorio cannot be used with a mobile device such as phone, tablet, or iPad. During a test, you may not cover your webcam or muffle the audio in any way. Doing so will result in a 0 which will be factored into your grade. After your exam ends, only your instructor will have access to your exam data. Recordings remain confidential, viewed only by your instructor and relevant administrators if deemed necessary.
