

2023 PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT







Greetings, Pensacola State family and friends.

In 2023, the College celebrated a historic milestone – its 75th anniversary.

Pensacola State College opened in 1948 with 136 students in a downtown Pensacola boarding house. Today, PSC has seven locations – Pensacola, Milton and Warrington campuses, the Century Center, Downtown Center, South Santa Rosa Center and the Santa Rosa Industrial Park East.

Over 123,500 students have become Pensacola State alumni – earning associate and bachelor degrees and workforce certificates from the College. Currently, over 21,400 students are enrolled in classes.

The College has aligned with ST Engineering, the City of Pensacola, FloridaWest Economic Development Alliance, Santa Rosa (County) Economic Development, and Triumph Gulf Coast to operate an Aviation Maintenance Training Academy to train skilled workers in airframe power plant mechanics for the region's developing aviation industry.

PSC was also awarded a \$2.5 million Community Development Block Grant to bolster building trades training and employment in Hurricane Sally-impacted communities.

During the historic 75th anniversary year, the College opened the state-of-the-art Bear Jones Moore Reeves Center for Math and Advanced Technology. Located on the Pensacola campus, the center is the second phase of replacing the Baars Building (the first structure built in 1957 on the Ninth Avenue campus).

The Joe Ambersley and Pete Peña basketball court was unveiled on Oct. 12. The name honors Coach Peña, PSC's basketball coach for the past 15 years, and his longtime friend and PSC Athletics supporter, Joe Ambersley.

Other highlights of the President's Report include the Lady Pirates Volleyball Team's spectacular season. The team finished fourth at the NJCAA Division II Women's Volleyball National Tournament in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. This was the program's first time making it to The Final Four at Nationals.

As in previous years, U.S. News and World Report ranked the online Bachelor of Science in Nursing Program No. 3 in Florida and 74th in the U.S.

For the 14th consecutive year, PSC was named a 2023 Military Friendly® School by Viqtory Media. PSC also earned the "Gold" designation for the second year.

The College was chosen as one of eight Bellwether Legacy Award finalists to compete for the 2024 Legacy Award. In 2017, Pensacola State's Virtual Tutoring Program won the national Bellwether Award – beating out more than 2,500 applicants.

PSC remains committed to student success by offering small classes, exemplary faculty, and a quality postsecondary education ranked nationally in the Top 1 percent for affordability.

The College's donors, friends and supporters for the past 75 years have and continue to make a tremendous difference in the lives of thousands upon thousands of our students.

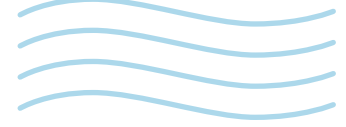

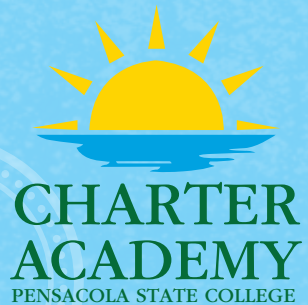

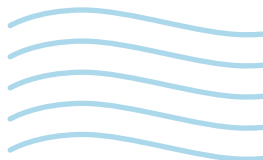

Nurse Explorer Boot Camp

In July, 11 Northwest Florida high school students participated in the first-ever Nurse Explorer Boot Camp on Pensacola State College's Warrington campus. Funded by a \$50,000 HCA Florida West Hospital grant, the Nurse Explorer Boot Camp Program included the camp where high school seniors learned various aspects of the nursing profession and worked with the PSC nursing faculty and simulation specialists in real-life situations.

During the fall, the students gathered to hear speakers in the nursing and other health care fields and take on additional educational challenges. 2023 U.S. News and World Report

In January, Pensacola State College's online RN to BSN (Bachelor of Science in Nursing) Program was ranked among the best in the Florida College System, the state and nation by U.S. News and World Report. In the publication's "Best Online Bachelor's Programs 2023 Edition," the program was

ranked third among FCS institutions, 10th among all Florida colleges and universities and 74th in the United States. The online RN to BSN Program was ranked second in the FCS, seventh among all Florida colleges and universities and 43rd in the U.S. in the publication's 2023 Best Online Bachelor's Program for Veterans category.



2023-2024 Gold Military Friendly® School

In March, Pensacola State College was named a 2023-2024 Gold Military Friendly® School by Victory Media. This was the 14th year the College has received the accolade and the second consecutive year earning the gold designation.



PSC Rebuilds

In July, Pensacola State College was awarded nearly \$2.5 million in Community Development Block Grant — Disaster Recovery funds to bolster construction trades employment in Hurricane Sally-impacted communities.

PSC, George Stone Technical College, CareerSource Escarosa and Habitat for Humanity will collaborate to train low- to moderate-income residents in the carpentry, electrical, HVAC (heating, ventilation, and air conditioning), masonry, plumbing and welding trades.

The short-term noncollege credit boot camps will allow students to earn certificates and jumpstart careers in construction. Titled PSC ReBuilds, the short-

term boot camps are based on National Center for Construction Education and Research (NCCER) requirements for entry-level certification. Boot camps started in early 2024.

The Florida Department of Commerce announced the \$2,499,541.64 grant under the Rebuild Florida Workforce Recovery Training Program. The program was launched to fund local workforce development boards, educational institutions and technical centers in communities most impacted by Hurricane Sally. The Category 2 storm caused more than \$7.3 billion in estimated damages when it hit the Florida Panhandle and coastal Alabama on Sept. 18, 2020.



Bellwether Award

In October, Pensacola State College was selected as one of eight Bellwether Legacy Award Finalists to compete for the 2024 Legacy Award.

The nationally recognized Bellwether Legacy Award identifies and honors an innovative community college program that demonstrates five or more years of student

success. It is a replicable, scalable, equity-focused program with years of evidenced-based success.

In 2017, Pensacola State's Virtual Tutoring Program won the Bellwether Award in the Instructional Programs and Services category — beating out more than 2,500 applicants and nine other top finalists.



Florida Blue & Pirates CARE

In October, Pensacola State College was awarded a \$300,000 Florida Blue Foundation grant to be used over four years to offer students mental health and case management services and mental health training to community members and caregivers.

The College will use the grant to offer full-time mental health and case management

services on the Warrington campus.

The initiative — The Pirates CARE: Holistic Approach to Community Health Program — provides trauma-informed counseling and case management services to low-income, high-need, at-risk students (teens, adults and seniors) and mental health training to parents and caregivers across Escambia and Santa Rosa counties.

Pensacola State College Celebrates 75th Anniversary

Sept. 13, 2023, was a red-letter date for Pensacola State — the College commemorated its 75th anniversary with a full day of celebratory events.

The College opened on Sept. 13, 1948, with 136 students in Akins Boarding House in downtown Pensacola.

Today, the College boasts more than 121,000 graduates and PSC's footprint includes seven campuses and centers — Pensacola, Milton, Warrington, Downtown, Century, South Santa Rosa, and a Truck Driving Training Facility in the Santa Rosa Industrial Park East.

The celebration began with a noon cookout for students, followed by an afternoon social for employees, and culminated with a community gala at the Jean and Paul Amos Performance Studio at WSRE-TV that night.

Pensacola, Gulf Breeze, Escambia and Santa Rosa counties signed proclamations recognizing the College's milestone. Gulf Breeze Mayor Cherry Fitch, Escambia County Commissioner Lumon May, Santa Rosa Commissioner Colton Wright and City of Pensacola Economic Development and Neighborhood Services Director

Erica Grancagnolo read and presented the documents to PSC District Board of Trustees Chair Dr. Troy Tippet.

Current and former members of the PSC Board of Trustees — Dona Usry, Carol Carlan, Julie Sheppard, Patrick Dawson, Ed Moore, Gordon "Flash" Sprague, Monsignor Luke Hunt and Frank White — toasted the College at the gala.

Dr. Lusharon Wiley, Pensacola Mayor D.C. Reeves, and former mayors Jerry Maygarden, Grover Robinson IV and Mike Wiggins also were on hand and congratulated the College. Robinson is the College's associate vice president of government and community relations.

Pensacola State College alums and married couples Jay and Lynne Butcher, Kelsey and Stephanie Powell, and Charlie and Fran Switzer sliced the 75th-anniversary cake.

The event was standing-room only, with longtime PSC supporters — Sandy Sansing, former Pensacola council member PC Wu, Jan Miller, Jim Reeves, Pensacola council member and PSC faculty member Jennifer Brahier,

David Sutton, Escambia County Property Appraiser Chris Jones, Scott Luth, Dr. and Mrs. Gaylon McCollough, Trey Poirier and Ron Jackson — in attendance.

The day-long celebration started with a lunchtime 75th Anniversary Pirate Cookout for students in the Building 5 Gazebo on the Pensacola campus. Students enjoyed hotdogs, chips, cold drinks, desserts, and music by Pensacola State alum DJ DT (David Taylor). Chandler White, PSC Student Engagement and Leadership Coordinator, along with students, sliced a 75th Anniversary cake.

At 2 p.m., PSC faculty and staff employees celebrated with an event in the Student Center where Jasmine Brown, Monique Collins, Mary Anne Petruska, Juanita Scott, Mike Will and Rick Dunn joined Dr. Meadows in an anniversary toast. The event was livestreamed to the other PSC campuses and centers.

PENSACOLA STATE COLLEGE HISTORY



Pensacola State College began as Pensacola Junior College – Florida's first public junior college established under the Minimum Foundation Program Law in 1947.

On Sept. 13, 1948, 136 students attended classes in Aiken Boarding House with James L. McCord as the director.



In 1962, PSC became one of three Florida colleges to establish a dental hygiene program.



In 1981, PSC opened a center at Naval Air Station Pensacola to offer classes to military and civilian personnel.

In 1965 the area's first planetarium opened to the public.

PJC and Booker T. Washington Junior College merged.

WSRE-TV Channel 23 went on the air.

In 1957, the first students attended classes in the new Mary Ellison Baars Building 1 on Ninth Avenue.

In 1958, the College introduced a two-year nursing program in a joint venture with Baptist Hospital.

In 1977, the \$8 million Warrington campus opened on 164.7 acres of land donated by the U.S. government.

In 1953, the College moved to the former Pensacola High School on Lee Square.

In 1971, the PSC Milton Center opened in the former Canal Street School in Milton with William H. Massey as the director.





In 1982, the College purchased an 80-acre site along U.S. 90 for the new Milton Center, which opened for classes in 1985. The center's Phase II was completed in 1986.

In 2002, the Anna Lamar Switzer Center for Visual Arts opened, and the Charles A. Atwell Health Sciences Complex was dedicated.

In 2010, the State Board of Education elevated the Milton Center to Milton Campus.

In 2013, the College unveiled a new logo reflecting PSC's name change and beautiful coastal area.

On Sept. 20, 2022, PSC cut the ribbon on the 13,000-square-foot Truck Driver Training Facility in Milton's Santa Rosa Industrial Park East.

In 1989, the College's Downtown Center opened in the Blount Building.

In March 2005, the 16,257 square-foot Jean and Paul Amos Performance Studio was dedicated. Several PBS celebrities attended the event.

The Baroco Center for Science and Advanced Technology was dedicated in 1990. The 125,000-square-foot center was designed to provide the latest in science, mathematics, computer science, and advanced technology programs and house a high-tech planetarium.

The \$7 million, 43,000 square-foot Kugelman Center for Telecommunications opened in 1994 to house WSRE-TV, the area's first digital television station.

On July 1, 2010, Pensacola Junior College officially became Pensacola State College to reflect its expanded mission to offer workforce and bachelor degrees.

In January 2012, Pensacola State opened the new 35,000-square-foot South Santa Rosa Center. The Century Center also opened in 2012.

Today, 75 years later, the College boasts an enrollment of more than 21,400 students with over 123,500 graduates.



In 1997, President Horace "Ed" Hartsell and the District Board of Trustees announced plans to build an 80-foot bell tower on the Pensacola campus as part of PJC's 50th anniversary celebration. The carillon was named after PJC alum M.J. Menge, the College's general counsel for 31 years.



In April 2021, the College unveiled the state-of-the-art Baars Technology Building. The \$15 million 23,839-square-foot facility is home to STEM programs and other high-tech fields of study.

On Oct. 30, 2023, the ceremonial ribbon was cut on the Bear Jones Moore Reeves Center for Mathematics and Advanced Technology.

The Joe Ambersley and Pete Peña basketball court was unveiled on Oct. 12 in Hartsell Arena. 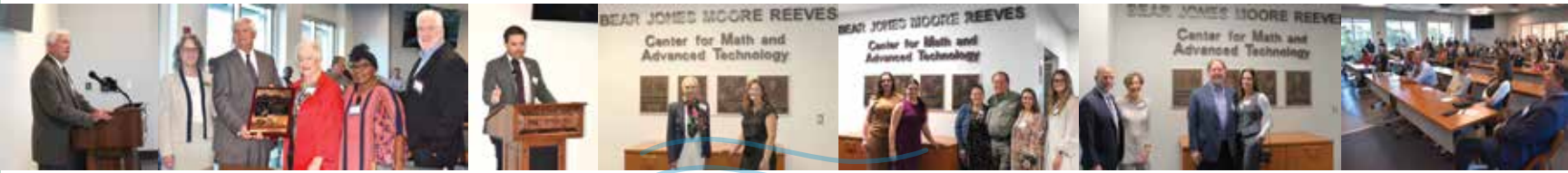
Phillips was named the Player of the Year, and Coach Mark Yepishin was selected as Coach of the Year.

PSC Cuts Ribbon on Bear Jones Moore Reeves Center

It was a day of celebration as the ceremonial ribbon was cut on Oct. 30 on Pensacola State College's new Bear Jones Moore Reeves Center for Math and Advanced Technology.

The Bear Jones Moore Reeves Center for Math and Advanced Technology will provide state-of-the-art instructional space for our math department and enable us to expand our advanced technology and cybersecurity programs. Our cybersecurity programs are among our most rapidly growing degrees.

The first classes were held in the new 59,080-square-foot facility in January 2024.

Construction on the \$22.5 million facility started in June 2022. The building is Phase II of the College's STEM complex. Phase I — the Baars Technology Building — opened in 2021.

The center's name pays homage to the Bear Family Foundation, the late Bill and Jo Jones, the Pete Moore Family and

James "Jim" Reeves. The group collectively donated \$1 million to the College to fund STEM-related scholarships.

The Bear Jones Moore Reeves Center has eight classrooms/lecture halls, four computer labs, one emerging technologies lab, one prototyping area, 19 faculty offices, and a department head suite complete with individual offices for the department head and assistant department head.

A 2,735-square-foot rooftop venue is also part of the center, along with a third-floor connector linking the Phase I and Phase II buildings.

Several Northwest Florida dignitaries were on hand for the ribbon cutting, including Hal George, who represented State Sen. Doug Broxson; David Bear, chairman of the Triumph Gulf Coast Board of Directors; Pensacola Mayor D.C. Reeves; and Escambia County Commissioners Robert Bender, Jeff Bergosh and Mike Kohler.

Dr. Troy Tippet, PSC Board of Trustees chairman, and some other board members were on hand for the event. Representing the scholarship donors were Bear family members; the late Pete Moore's widow and daughter, Angela Moore and Jacqueline Moore Pommerening; (Jim) Reeves; and Kay Margedant and Jay Margedant, the sister and nephew of the late Bill Jones.

Along with \$18.9 million in state funding, a \$11,998,919 Triumph Gulf Coast grant was used to fund the construction of the Bear Jones Moore Reeves Center for Math and Advanced Technology. Triumph Gulf Coast is the organization charged by the state of Florida with distributing the \$1.5 billion settlement from BP stemming from the 2010 oil spill.

Florida Architects designed the Phase I and Phase II buildings. Ajax Corp was the Phase I general contractor. The Morette Company is the Phase II general contractor.



Florida Power and Light Company Innovation Center

A Public Broadcasting Service member station licensed to Pensacola State College, WSRE PBS serves more than 588,000 households in the Mobile-Pensacola (Fort Walton) media market with multi-platform distribution of local productions, PBS programming and the No. 1 educational media brand for children.

The station broadcasts five channels: WSRE PBS, PBS KIDS, Create, WORLD and — new this year — WSRE PBS Connect. The Connect channel is now home to The Florida Channel broadcast, PSC Pirates sports, and past episodes of local productions.

Local programs produced by WSRE PBS in 2023 included new episodes of “Connecting the Community,” “Conversations with Jeff Weeks,” “inStudio,” “Pensacola State Today,” and the station’s long-running music series, “StudioAmped.”

In addition to scheduled broadcasts, viewers have anytime access to the station’s programming at PBS.org, WSRE.org, and on the free PBS and PBS KIDS apps, watching on demand and via livestream from mobile devices and popular digital services. Additionally, hundreds of free educational games are available to local families on the free PBS KIDS Games app, and local teachers use PBS LearningMedia for free access to standards-aligned classroom resources.

WSRE PBS also engages with communities across the coverage area through educational activities and dedicated events that provide opportunities for civic engagement, enlightening conversation and exposure to the arts.

‘The U.S. and the Holocaust’ Teacher Training

WSRE PBS contracted with the Holocaust Memorial Resource and Education Center of Florida for education curator Stephen Poynor to lead two professional development workshops Jan. 21 and Aug. 4 on Holocaust education for local teachers.

PSC Spanish Film Festival

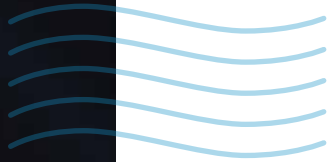
